What is the GED?

GED® stands for “General Educational Development” tests. The GED® is a group of subject tests that covers the core academic areas of a high school curriculum. The test was first developed in 1942 to allow returning WWII veterans to complete their high school studies and move on to higher education or the workforce. The GED® eventually became available to the general population. Today, the GED® test represents a second chance for adults who did not finish high school. It is a nationally recognized high school equivalency credential.

Why do I need a GED?

Employment: In today’s highly competitive workforce, a high school diploma or GED® is required to be considered for many jobs, even entry level jobs.

Earning power: The GED® testing service estimates that an adult with a high school credential earns, on average, \$568,000 more over the course of a lifetime than an adult without a credential.

Higher education: Many careers require some post-secondary education. To be eligible to apply for federal financial aid at an institution of higher learning, an individual must hold a high school diploma or GED®.

Curriculum

Our GED® class prepares adults without a high school diploma to take the 2014 GED® tests. We provide lessons in Language Arts (Reading and Writing), Mathematics, Science, and Social Studies. Instruction is tailored to meet individual student needs. We have helped hundreds of students pass their GED® tests and move on to better jobs and higher education.

The 2014 GED® test has four parts:

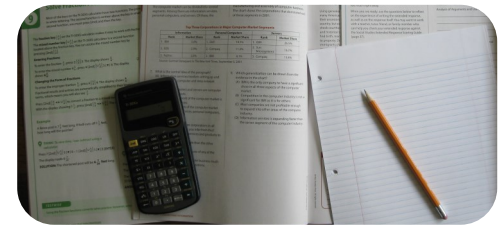
- Reasoning Through Language Arts (RLA) —150 minutes
- Mathematical Reasoning —115 minutes
- Science —90 minutes
- Social Studies —70 minutes

The new 2014 GED® test is administered on computer only. We provide computer practice as part of our GED curriculum to ensure all students are comfortable with the new computer based test format.



How to enroll

Stop in at the Employment Skills Center and fill out an application. You will be asked to take assessments in Reading and Mathematics. These assessments are not GED® tests or GED® practice tests—they are tools used to help us evaluate your current reading and math skills so we can better assist you in reaching your academic goals. You will then meet with our GED® program manager for an intake appointment. During this appointment, you can discuss your goals and ask any questions you have about the GED® program. Together, we will develop an individual learning plan so you can get started on the path to earning your GED®!



Pre-GED classes

Your math and reading assessment scores will help us place you in the class that best suits your learning needs. We offer Pre-GED classes to assist students in developing their math and language arts skills before entering the GED® preparation class.

Class schedule

Our GED® and Pre-GED classes meet at the Employment Skills Center on Tuesdays and Thursdays 9:00 am to 12:00 pm. Individual and small group tutoring is also available.
